Sociolinguistic Patterns. This section is concerned with the findings of social or urban dialectology on linguistic variation. Urban dialectology studies language variation in urban regions. Classic studies within this area focus on variation in cities such as New York, Chicago and Detroit in the USA and Norwich in England.

Likewise, as dialects change over time, patterns of the /r/ usage will change as well. This was essentially the focus of William Labov's 1966 linguistic experiment on the presence of rhoticity (pronunciation of the /r/ sound before pauses and consonants) in the speech of the New York City population.
