Egyptian clothing was made from locally-sourced materials—as were clothes from all ancient societies. Pastoral nomads created clothing from their livestock. AS one of the earliest agricultural societies, the ancient Egyptians wore light clothes made from linen. Linen is made from flax – a plant which was grown along the Nile.

The most common headdress was the klafta or nemes, a striped fabric square worn by men. Certain clothing was common to both genders, such as the tunic and the robe. Around 1425 to 1405 BC, a light tunic or short-sleeved shirt was popular, as well as a pleated skirt.

Shades of brown, red, orange, green and yellow, were the most common. Initially, pigments were obtained from plants grown nearby. Once the Europeans settled there, these pigments were replaced with artificial acrylic dyes. The festive occasions demanded more color in the clothing.

People who belonged to the lower strata of society wore clothing made from materials like wool, sheepskin, and linen. They were not allowed to wear materials in silk or even have velvet trimmings in their clothes. The colors that could be worn by them were brown, beige, yellow, orange, russet, green, gray, and blue (not the deep rich indigo).
